Dear Fellow Mystics,

Greetings from Two Thomases' Hermitage, now day 351. We sorrowfully mourn the passing of our beloved Fr. William Meninger, OCSO, who died peacefully on February 14th at age 88 at St. Joseph's Abbey in Spencer, Mass. The day before his death he led an international Zoom talk on the gospel of Mark. Born in 1932 in Malden, Mass., he entered St. Joseph's Abbey in 1963, made his solemn profession in 1970, changed stability to Snowmass in 1982 and changed his stability back to Spencer in 2020. He had been



ordained a priest of the Diocese of Yakima, Washington in 1958. He had been in monastic vows for 55 years and 63 years a priest. Fr. William was our last living of the three principal architects of the Centering Prayer method and movement. His bright spirit and delight in the love of God beckoned us to follow him with Fr. Thomas Keating and Fr. Basil Pennington to Centering Prayer as the way for our transformation into the Love of God. His books include *St. John of the Cross for Beginners*, Julian of Norwich: *A Mystic for Today*, *The Loving Search for God: Contemplative Prayer and the Cloud of Unknowing*, and his latest, *The Process of Forgiveness*, found in Contemplative Outreach Ltd.'s store here.. His down to earth, approachable, humble, direct personality emanated joy in his love for God right to the end. Thanks to CO Tallahassee, who this past year have been hosting his talks available on their YouTube Channel here.. Fr. William's Burial Mass was celebrated at Spencer Abbey, Monday, February 22nd. from the other side. I seem to have tasted before the mysterious sweetness of this
enveloping, permeating Presence. It is both emptiness and fullness at once.

We wait patiently; in silence, in openness, and quiet attentiveness; motionless within and without. We surrender to the attraction to be still, to be loved, just to be."
